## Welcome to the First Convention

As this October-November number of LIGHT FROM THE EAST goes to press, the first National Convention of the Church of the East in the United States is about to meet in Chicago, the Patriarchal City. Delegates will come from Church committees, Daughters of the East and Young Peoples Societies of each parish in this country. Sessions will be held at the Patriarchate, 6346 N. Sheridan Road, and at Mar Sargis Church.

This convention, summoned by the Patriarch, marks a tremendous step forward in the development of the Church in this country.

To it will be reported the great events of the past year in Japan, in India, in Iran, in Iraq, in Syria, in Lebanon, and all over the world.

# Japan Opens Arms to Church of East

In a swift and unexpected series of developments Japan has opened its arms to the Church of the East. In a cablegram dated Sept. 28, His Holiness the Patriarch of the East approved the formation of an "Association for the Reinstatement of the Church of the East" by a group of eminent persons who had asked for his authorization of this move.

Fourteen signatures were appended to the petition, dated Aug. 27. A letter of Sept. 6 added other names. They are all the names of persons of high standing, headed by a professor of political history in the Imperial University of Kyoto, and including public officials of various ranks and the superior of a Temple in Kyoto.

The Patriarch's cablegram said;

"Proposal heartily approved with blessing. Start work immediately. Letter and books follow." A shipment of books and pamphlets was dispatched at once to give the new ARICE ("Association for the Reinstatement of the Church of the East") materials with which to work.

Immediately following this exchange of communications, a letter was received from Japan announcing a national religious mass meeting on Oct. 6, at which all religions—Christian, Shinto, Buddhist, Moslem and Jinja faiths—were invited to join. The Patriarch was asked to send a representative to join in honoring the dead of World War II, and in praying for permanent world peace. His Holiness replied at once by cable, extending his blessing to the national mass meeting, and announcing that he joins in prayer for these two objectives.

In this issue is published an extraordinary bulletin appearing in the Osaka Shimbun, headed "A Living Christ" and revealing the excitement caused in Japan by the discovery that the Nestorian Church, which flourished in Japan 1600 years ago, was still active.

His Holiness, the Patriarch is awaiting information in regard to the status of the persons who are thus asking for the reinstatement of the ancient Church of Asia. It is his hope to send clergy, and perhaps a bishop, to ordain Japanese clergy who can place the church of their forefathers again on a firm footing in the empire of Japan.

# **SYRIA**

In Syria, crops are good, and there is plenty of food. The Seminary at Tell Tamer has opened for the third successive year. Ordination of older members of the school as deacons is planned, and it is hoped that soon some of them will be ready for the priesthood, to replenish the sorely depleted ranks of the sacred ministry.

#### A LIVING CHRIST

In the United States lives the 119th Patriarch Letter from American gives information to Prof. Ikeda

It is reported that Christianity was first introduced into Japan by a Rev. Savell (Xavier) some four hundred years ago, but Prof. Sakae Ikeda, formerly of Kyoto Imperial University, announced recently through the Associated Press that the Nestorian sect of Christianity was brought to Japan about the same time Buddhism was introduced into Japan.

Prof. Ikeda's specialty is Seitoku Taishi, who introduced Buddhism into Japan, or was instrumental in propagating it with greatest effect.

After the 16th century it was believed the Nestorian sect had disappeared from the earth, but some time ago Mr. Emanuel Hoyen, of Massachusetts, wrote Prof. Ikeda that the headquarters of this sect still exists in Chicago, although the membership is very small.

In reply to Mr. Hoyen's letter, Prof. Ikeda requested that some facts proving the existence of this Nestorian sect, and a leader of the sect, be sent to Japan to study the historic facts of the sect.

#### IRAN

#### IRANIAN EDICTS CURBS ACTIVITIES OF ALL FOREIGN RELIGIOUS BODIES

In an edict of tremendous importance to the religious world, the government of Iran has decreed restrictions on the activities of non-Moslem religious groups in Iran. The great majority of Iranians are Moslems. There are about 70,000 Jews and about 120,000 Armenian and Assyrian Christians. Leaders of all non-Moslem religious groups must be subjects of the imperial government and shall be concerned with religious matters only.

It is indicated as a result of inquiries immediately made by priests of the Church of the East, that this decree does not prohibit officials of this Church from following their normal activities in connection with Iranian members and churches. The edict is aimed particularly at political interference under the guise of religious activity, by foreign groups.

This edict makes supremely necessary the building up of the Church of the East, which is the Church of Iran. As the Roman Catholic Church was the church in the Roman empire, and the Greek Orthodox Church was the church of the Byzantine empire, so the Church of the East was for centuries the Church of the Persian Empire, now the Iranian empire.

Within the past two months very great advances have been made by the Church in Iran. New churches are being built, new schools established, a seminary organized, and new priests are about to be ordained.

Support of these schools is a matter of life or death for the Church, which evidently is to be the bearer of the Christian message to the whole of Asia.

#### **NEW CHURCH IN ABADAN**

Since the appointment of a Visitor General and an Administrative Committee for the Church in Iran, great progress has been made throughout the country. Money has been raised and a new church is being built at Abadan. Its cost is 300,000 tomans, or roughly \$54,000 in United States dollars. Of this sum, 150,000 tomans was contributed immediately by members of the church, and the remainder is being checked out of their pay by employees of the companies which employ them.

The Visitor General (Sa'ura Gavanaya) Shmuel of Kelaita, reports that Shimun Bagina of Tehran, according to a promise previously made, has purchased land suitable for the building of a Church, rooms for the theological school, and a rectory.

A committee has been chosen to complete the collection of the funds and to supervise the building of the church. Members of the committee are: Shimun Bagina, Kashisha Ruwil, Gabriel Joseph, Israel Joseph, Mushey Barkhoo, Shimun Benjamin, Shamasha Haidoo, Isaac Yagdan, and William Daniel.

#### PATRIARCH URGES ALL TO WORK FOR PENCE SYSTEM

It is well known that support of the theological schools in the Middle East, in Syria and Iran, has depended wholly upon the Patriarchal Pence. This system of collecting a penny per person per meal in the homes of the people has been of very great help in maintaining the school on the Khabour.

Nevertheless, most of the church people in the UnitedStates do not as yet have the Patriarchal Pence Cans in their homes. This has been due either to the carelessness of those to whom this most important work has been entrusted, or it has been the fault of the families themselves, who do not attend church regularly, and thus keep themselves out of the church's affairs.

The consequence is heavy financial loss to the church.

The Patriarch therefore asks those who have undertaken this important task to attend to their duties with more fervor and devotion. He likewise urges every family to obtain Patriarchal Pence Cans from those to which this task has been entrusted.

Furthermore, despite announcement by the priest, many persons fail to turn their Pence Cans in to the church in time. This causes further loss, and constitutes a drawback to the work of the church.

His Holiness has written to the authorities of the Church of the East in India, Iran, Iraq and Syria, that the Patriarchal Pence system should be established thruout the church

He has urged, also, that they assist the theological schools by means of gifts of food, clothing and similar necessities. If this is done, the Patriarch hopes and believes firmly that with God's blessing these schools can be carried on with ease and success, and many years will not pass before priests and bishops will come out of these schools and go through Asia and the world as they came out of the glorious universities of Edessa and Nisibis, centuries ago.

#### MAR SARGIS CHURCH REPAIRED, REPAINTED AND NEWLY FURNISHED

During the summer and fall, the Church of Mar Sargis, in Chicago, has been thoroughly repaired and renovated. A leaky roof was mended, the walls and ceiling replastered and repainted; and brick asphalt sheathing nailed to the apartment buildings surrounding.

The church has been refitted with new benches, new carpets, a new heating plant, with much other beautifully carved and finished equipment.

This was purchased from the Rev. Ivor Hadley, rector of St. Matthias Episcopal Church, at a great reduction in price. The old chairs were in bad condition, the heating system likewise.

It is hoped to be able to install a wooden floor in the adjoining basement, so that it can again be used for meetings.

One of the apartments has been made over into an assembly room for gatherings such as those of the young people and the Assyrian Veterans.

Most of the work was done under direction of E.L. Hormis, a member of the church committee and of the Patriarchal Council.

# **IRAQ**

#### METROPOLITAN COMPLETES TOUR OF IRAQ

The Metropolitan Khnanishoo has completed his first visit in many years to Northern Iraq. His tour required forty-two days, during which he went to every church and community where Assyrians live in Northern Iraq. Everywhere he encountered fervent delight at his coming. Expressions of undying loyalty and devotion to the church and to the Patriarchate were voiced by all he met.

A new church is being built at Kurkuk. Ground has been bought, money subscribed, and the work is going forward with speed. It is hoped that before long it will be ready for consecration.

#### NEW KIRKUK CHURCH REVIVES MEMORY OF TOWN'S 153,000 MARTYRS

News from the metropolitan of Iraq that a church is being built in the town of Kirkuk revives memories of the glorious and tragic days of the faith of the Church of the East.

Kirkuk is a town with a very long history. In the year 448 A.D. a persecution broke out against the Christians, ordered by the emperor Yezdegerd II.

A massacre of appalling magnitude took place at Kirkuk, then known as Karka d'Beth Sluk. On a mound outside the city, ten bishops and 153,000 others suffered martyrdom, the slaughter having lasted several days. The redness of the gravel of the hillock is said to have been caused by the blood of the martyrs. A martyrium, commemorating this heroic sacrifice, was built over the spot, and remains to this day.

Some of the victims were crucified, some stoned, some beheaded. Clergy and laity alike suffered intense tortures. A woman named Sihrin, hearing of the

slaughter, came with her two sons, saying they desired also to testify for Christ; and the three of them were slain.

The person who took the most active part in this persecution was Tamasgerd an officer of the king, who was so moved by the cheerful endurance of the Christians that he joined himself to them, and received the crown of martyrdom with them.

When John, metropolitan of Kirkuk, was being led to his death, a youth in the crowdurged him to be of good cheer. The metropolitan, turning to him, declared he was fit to be consecrated in his place. The youth, named Dindui, was ordained metropolitan, but within two or three days also paid with his life for his courage.

After the persecution, the bishops who survived in the surrounding provinces gathered on the spot, and decreed a solemn annual memorial to those who perished there. For nearly two milleniums the Christians of the little town gathered at the red hillock on Sept. 25th (Old style) to offer prayer and thanksgiving in homage to the memory of those who died here.

# EASTERN TOUR OF THE PATRIARCHAL FAMILY

For the first time since reaching this country, the members of the Patriarchal Family made an extended tour for the purpose of meeting members of the church and nation in other cities.

The Rab Khaila and Lady Helen d'Mar Shimun left Chicago Sept. 1, in a car driven by John Lachen, accompanied by his father, Shamasha Sliwo. They stayed in Pittsburgh that night, and reached New York Friday, Sept. 2, where the Patriarch greeted them. They proceeded immediately to New Britain, Conn., arriving there Friday night.

A banquet was tendered them at the Hotel Sheraton, New Britain, Saturday night, attended by some 200 persons. Dr. George M.Lamsa was toastmaster. Speakers were the Rev. Sargis Benjamin, the Rev. Stephen Khubyar (Presbyterian), the Rev. Richard Pera (Lutheran), and the Patriarchal Archdeacon, Rev. S. D. Neesan. Albert Sargis was chairman of the committee on arrangements.

On Sunday, Sept. 4, at 7 a.m. the Patriarch celebrated the Qurbana Qaddisha at St. Mark's Episcopal Church, a congregation which filled the church, attending.

On Monday, the Patriarch was invited as a personal guest to the home of Emanuel Hoyen, of Worcester, Mass., where a group of Assyrians living in Worcester paid their respects. His Holiness was accompanied by his father, the Rab Khaila, his sister, Lady Helen, and the archdeacon. During the following days Lady Helen and the Rab Khaila were guests of the parish of Mar Tuma. All meals were served there by the Daughters of the Church of the East, to whom the party offers thanks for their hospitality.

In Philadelphia the Patriarch celebrated the Qurbana Qaddisha on Sunday, Sept.11, at St. Simeon's Episcopal Church. He was attended by deacons Issac Nona and Nichola Sliwoo. Hospitality was extended by Shamash Sliwoo and Aprim Beth Mar Elia of Gugtapa, on Saturday and Sunday.

In commenting on this visit, His Holiness referred to the Rev. Charles B. Dubell, rector of St. Simeon's, as the"perfect priest, for years kind to our people in Philadelphia." On this occasion he placed the church at the disposal of the Assyrian congregation on only two days notice.

Monday the party returned to New York. On Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday, Dr. Kaufman Grinstead showed the Lady Helen and the Rab Khaila the sights of New York. Thursday they went to Yonkers and were house guests of George Burney. On the 18th the Patriarch celebrated the Qurbana Qaddisha in St. Andrews church, Yonkers attended by the largest congregation in years. Daughters of the Church of the East provided a banquet in the Parish Hall.

On Wednesday, a banquet was given in St. John's Parish Hall. The rector emeritus, Dr. O.S. Newell, the present rector, Dr. L.J. Winterbottom, and the associate rector, Dr. Marvin, spoke; also the Rev. Michael Yacoe. Responses were made by both the illustrious guests. Arrangements were made by the church committee, with George Burney as chairman.

On Friday, Sept. 23, the Church of New Britain gave a reception in honor of the archdeacon, their former pastor. On Saturday morning the party left for the return trip to Chicago.

On Sept. 20, the Patriarch lunched with the Iranian consul, in New York, along with a group of Iranians and American guests. On Sept. 22, the consul was the guest of the Patriarch at the Hotel.

"Ravoyeva (Rawojewa) Elvira, Assyrian (Armenian) born 27.4. 33 at Roslaw, Don. Parents' names: Ravoyeva (Rawojewa) Pavel, born 1904? Ayvazian, Lydia born May 1908. Ravoyeva (Rawojewa) is under the care of the International Refugee Organization in Germany. She states that her father was deported in 1937 and her mother was supposed to have been killed in an air-raid in 1944. She has an uncle, Ravoyev, Jacob Alexander, born 1898-1900? who emigrated to the States in 1921, but his address is unknown to her. This uncle seems to be the only surviving member of the family. The father of this child, whose name seems to have been Russianized, may have been deported from Russia to Tehran in 1937. It is possible that among the Assyrians in Tehran we might be able to secure some information which would help us to find this child's uncle in the United States. #### INDIA RALLYING TO SUPPORT OF PATRIARCHAL PENCE SYSTEM

In the first report of the Patriarchal School Pence Fund of the Church of the East in India, surprising enthusiasm is shown among the people as they learn of this method of supporting their schools or religion.

Deacon M.O. Vargheese, secretary of the fund, writes that in the month of July, collections were obtained from 550 boxes, against the 450 anticipated, - a gain of 100 pence boxes. It was expected that about 700 boxes would be collected during August, thus showing a still further substantial gain.

A bank account has been started in the Chaldaean Syrian Bank Ltd., in Trichur, with the sum of 315 rupees as the first deposit. This is a most encouraging beginning.

Members of the Fund Committee are: C.A. Porinchunny, chairman; C.P. Kunjuvaried, vice chairman; M.O. Thomakutty, treasurer, and Deacon M.O. Vargheese, secretary.

#### ASSYRIAN FEDERATION REPUDIATES MALIK

At a special meeting of the Executive Committee of the Assyrian National Federation held June 25, 1949, it was reported that the strong appeals made to Yusuf Malik and his associates by the Federation to stop circulating printed matter which brought joy only to the enemies of our race had not been heeded.

President Durna then read a letter of June 1, 1949, to Yusuf Malik, stating very emphatically that he did not approve of his work, and could not work with him any longer.

Furthermore, he stated the Federation would continue to work with and support Mar Shimun as the national leader of the Assyrians.

The Executive Council approved President Durna's letter, and requested that copies of it be sent to all affiliated associations, since this letter stated accurately the position of the Federation.

### LEBANON

Word from Lebanon conveys information that Antoun Saade, close associate of Yusuf Malik (Jojo) in the Brazilian hoax, has been hanged. According to Le Soir, published in Beirut, he had been found guilty of the crime of treason to his fatherland the republic of Lebanon.

Letters from Lebanon and Syria indicate that the people there, including those on the Khabour, have been awakened to the fraud perpetrated upon them by Yusuf Malik and his associates. It is hoped that, from now on, no Assyrians will fall victim to the tactics of such unscrupulous persons.

that the headquarters of this sect still exist on the West Side of Chicago, with a small membership. The doctrine of this sect has remained relatively unchanged since the time of Christ. This doctrine is quite similar to the Protestant belief, in that the people can be saved not by behavior, but by faith. The Nestorians do not recognize Mary as the Mother of God. The present patriarch is believed to be the 119th successor of Jesus Christ."

#### ...Professor Ikeda's statement...

"It is said that a Rev. Savell (Xavier) first introduced Christianity to Japan about four hundred years ago, but I have discovered some facts that the Nestorian sect of Christianity was brought to Japan about one thousand years before that time, by a Chinese immigrant. I can see some evidence of its existence still in Kyoto and its suburbs. I am hoping some interested person will come from America to Japan to study the historic facts of the Nestorian sect."

#### ...Comment by Shimbun...

"This disclosure, contradicting as it does the accepted belief that the sect ceased to exist after the 16th century, when the remnants of the followers of St. Paul, who established the sect, and were nearly completely wiped out in the 14th century, escaped to Rome and were converted to the Roman faith---is very interesting."
